E2SHB 1185	Reducing environmental impacts associated with lighting products.

<u>HB 1927</u>	Reducing the number of days that a worker's temporary total disability must continue to receive industrial insurance compensation for the day of an injury and the three-day period following the injury.
<u>HB 1950</u>	Concerning the public service loan forgiveness program.
<u>HB 1961</u>	Concerning animal cruelty in the first degree.
<u>HB 1975</u>	Relieving individuals from paying interest on certain unemployment insurance overpayment assessments.
<u>SHB 1985</u>	Providing a benefit increase to certain retirees of the public employees' retirement system plan 1 and the teachers' retirement system plan 1.
<u>SHB 1999</u>	Concerning fabricated intimate or sexually explicit images and depictions.
<u>2SHB 2014</u>	Concerning the definition of veteran and restoring honor to veterans.
<u>ESHB 2041</u>	Concerning physician assistant collaborative practice.

<u>SHB 2048</u>	Concerning supervision of domestic violence in criminal sentencing.
<u>SHB 2061</u>	Defining an employee of a health care facility for purposes of mandatory overtime provisions.
<u>2SHB 2084</u>	Establishing an oversight committee to improve construction-related training and pathways to state registered apprenticeships in state correctional facilities.
<u>E2SHB 2099</u>	Concerning state identification cards for persons in state custody or care.
<u>SHB 2153</u>	Deterring the theft of catalytic converters.
<u>HB 2213</u>	Concerning defects and omissions in the laws that have been identified by the justices of the supreme court or judges of the superior courts pursuant to Article IV, section 25 of the state Constitution.
<u>SHB 2216</u>	Reducing barriers to state employment by eliminating two-year and four-year degree requirements that are unnecessary.
<u>HB 2246</u>	Concerning vacation leave accrual for state employees.
<u>SHB 2303</u>	Modifying conditions of community custody.

<u>E2SHB 2311</u>	Supporting first responder wellness and peer support.
<u>HB 2481</u>	Waiving health insurance premiums during month of death for retired PEBB employees
<u>ESSB 5271</u>	Protecting patients in facilities regulated by the department of health by establishing uniform enforcement tools.
<u>ESSB 5424</u>	Concerning flexible work for general and limited authority Washington peace officers.
<u>SSB 5427</u>	Supporting people who have been targeted or affected by hate crimes and bias incidents by establishing a reporting hotline and tracking hate crimes and bias incidents.
<u>SSB 5588</u>	Concerning the mental health sentencing alternative.
<u>ESSB 5778</u>	Protecting the rights of workers to refrain from attending meetings or listening to their employer's speech on political or religious matters.
<u>ESSB 5793</u>	Concerning paid sick leave.
<u>ESSB 5891</u>	Protecting the safety and security of students and maintaining order within school buses by designating trespassing on a school bus as a criminal offense.

<u>2SSB 5893</u>	Providing gate money to incarcerated individuals at the department of corrections.
<u>SB 5904</u>	Extending the terms of eligibility for financial aid programs.
<u>SSB 5917</u>	Concerning criminal penalties for bias-motivated defacement of private or public property.
<u>E2SSB 5937</u>	Supporting crime victims and witnesses by promoting victim-centered, trauma-informed responses.
<u>SB 5938</u>	Modifying the community parenting alternative for eligible participants in the residential parenting program at the department of corrections.
<u>SSB 5953</u>	Concerning financial aid grants for incarcerated students.
<u>2SSB 6068</u>	Reporting on dependency outcomes.
<u>SSB 6146</u>	Concerning tribal warrants.
<u>SSB 6157</u>	Reforming civil service to permit deferred action for childhood arrivals recipients to apply for civil service and incorporate civil service advantage for bilingual and multilingual applicants, applicants with higher education, and applicants with prior work experience in social services.
